Mission Spotlight



Starting in the 1990s, about 1.5 million Somali people have been scattered via resettlement and migration to all corners of the world, including South Asia, Australia, New Zealand, northern Europe, Canada, and the United States. An estimated 150,000 to 200,000 Somalis live in the US.

Back in Somalia, civil war and instability have stretched on for more than 25 years. After two elected governments in the postcolonial period, a 22-year military dictatorship grew increasingly oppressive. It was overthrown in 1991 by a coalition of Clan base malicious Hoover unified only by their desire to overthrow the dictator. As Somali Society broke down, people were killed just for being the wrong Clan, weaker clans were severely oppressed, and Islamic fundamentalism presented itself as the answer to the breakdown of law and order in Somalia. With infrastructure destroyed, houses looted or destroyed by bombings, the threat of rape or death, lots of property, and little chance for education or a future, many families ran and Scattered. Many became displaced within the borders of their former country and some fled to other parts of Africa or the Middle East. Many others escaped to a neighboring country where they often lived for years in some of the world's largest refugee camps, waiting to be resettled to a third country.

Somali refugee-immigrants in the US face a number of difficulties. Many struggle to adapt to a very different way of life in urban centers. Education and employment present opportunities but also challenges. Children who missed out on education in Somalia or as refugees are expected to enter school at grade level, learning English as they go. Adults are expected to learn English and get employment within 6 months of arrival. Many men face the discouragement of not having their professional or occupational qualifications recognized. Men also lose the status they had as clan and family leaders in group-oriented Somali Society.

The increasingly large number of Somali people living in close proximity to American Christians presents an amazing opportunity for serious followers of Jesus to engage with them in friendship, build trust relationships, and find Opportunities to communicate gospel truths. Christians seem to be increasingly afraid of Muslim immigrants. Rather than reaching out in love, many seem to be growing more defensive. God, however, has his purposes in mind for all peoples: "From one man he made all the nations, that they should inhabit the whole earth; and he marked out their appointed times in history and the boundaries of their lands. God did this so that they would seek Him and perhaps reach out for him and find him, though he is not far from any one of us" (Acts 17:26-27).

Prayer Points:

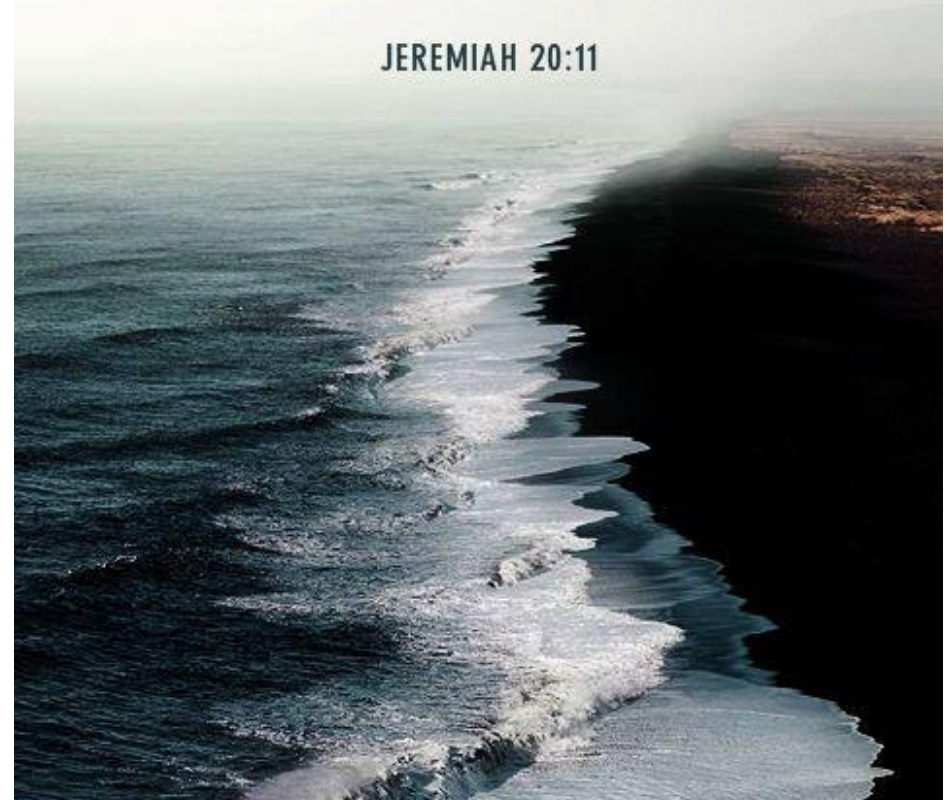
- * for peace, reconciliation, and political stability in Somalia leading to healing and economic rehabilitation
